Editorial: Rumour has it...

I am not a fan of Wikipedia, but for this editorial I decided to have a peek at what it had to say about what appears to be an ongoing issue in society; gossip. Here are some excerpts of what I found:

"Gossip is idle talk or rumour, especially about the personal or private affairs of others. It forms one of the oldest and most common means of sharing (unproven) facts and views, but also has a reputation for the introduction of errors and other variations into the information transmitted. The term also carries implications that the news so transmitted (usually) is of personal or trivial nature, as opposed to normal conversation.

The term is sometimes used to specifically refer to the spreading of dirt and misinformation, as (for example) through excited discussion of scandals."

What caused me to write about this here, you ask? The answer to that is simple. None of us are immune to taking part in gossip or backbiting. It happens among students, among parents, and also among staff members. It can happen wherever sinful people communicate with each other. As an administrator I regularly run into situations where I am asked to take action in response to incidents which, upon closer scrutiny, are based on hearsay. This can become very awkward, especially when I find out that, what has been reported as a serious incident is actually not even true.

So how serious is the spreading of rumours? Back to Wikipedia:

"Islam considers backbiting the equivalent of eating the flesh of one's dead brother. According to Muslims, backbiting harms its victims without offering them any chance of defense, just as dead people cannot defend against their flesh being eaten. Muslims are expected to treat each other like brothers, deriving from Islam's concept of brotherhood amongst its believers."

"Judaism considers gossip spoken without a constructive purpose (known in Hebrew as lashon hara) as a sin. Speaking negatively about people, even if retelling true facts, counts as sinful, as it demeans the dignity of man — both the speaker and the subject of the gossip. According to Proverbs 18:8: "The words of a gossip are like choice morsels: they go down to a man's innermost parts."

"Jesus also taught, in Matthew 18, that conflict resolution among church members ought to begin with the aggrieved party attempting to resolve their dispute with the offending party alone. Only if this did not work would the process escalate to the next step, in which another church member would become involved. After that, if the person at fault still would not "hear", the matter was to be fully investigated by the church elders. At no time did Jesus authorize exposing faults to anyone else. This process is meant to encourage Christians to get along, overlook offenses and if possible, work things out directly between the two parties involved. Since "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23), Christians are called to loving forgiveness and the spread of positive information rather than evil gossip that destroys relationships."

If Muslim, Jewish and Christian traditions all take gossip that seriously, we probably should take notice. As a school society we recognize the need to live by the Matthew 18 principle.

That's why we publish our grievance procedure in this newsletter on an annual basis. As students, parents, and staff connected to a Christian school, we all have a responsibility to put the words of Jesus into practice. If we don't, we can so easily create a culture of gossip and slander. The Heidelberg Catechism says: "*And I should do what I can to guard and advance my neighbour's good name*". If we all were to live by that, the "rumour-has-it-conversations" would not be part of our discussions. And if that happened it would be another way in which BVCS is different from those around us.

How quickly time moves on. We are in the second half of the school year. The students have written their exams and are into second semester subjects.

For some students that inevitable increases the workload. While the semestered system gives us the advantage of more subject choices over the span of the three year graduation program, it sometimes concentrates many of the labour intensive courses in a single semester. If the January report cards are any evidence, our students will be up to the challenge. They suggest that,

on the whole, our students work hard, desire good grades and generally see good success. Band & Choir are doing their chocolate bar sale to raise funds for their Spring Tour. Our grades 7-9 are participating in the Science Fair that will cumulate in presentations in two weeks.

Our International Student Jane Qain ranked with the top 100 Canadian contestants in trials for participation in a National Math competition next month. We are confident that she will perform well.

On February 23rd we hope to hold Anti-Bullying Day. The purpose is to raise awareness about bullying and to help further develop a school culture that is inclusive of all students. In that context we are also looking forward to the Home and School evening of March 14 where staff hopes to get together with parents to talk about our school's role in combating bullying. Statement from the Educational Creed Document

As in past issues of *The Grapevine* here is a sampling of just two statements, this time from the Educational Creed document:

- *We explore and care for creation, restore relationships, work for justice, and use talents, gifts and opportunities. We work hard to develop our students' minds, hearts, and bodies. We do this because God calls us to love Him and our neighbor and to be faithful. The gift of salvation affects both our lives now and our eternal status.*
- *We value and respect every student regardless of academic potential, personality, or socio-economic status. God has made each person in His image for His glory. Classroom structures and learning opportunities are shaped by this belief so all students genuinely know that God loves them and has died for their sins. The things that are taught in classes and the lives lived by the teachers emphasize the need for all to speak of Jesus Christ as the Saviour of the world and of God the Father as the Creator and Keeper of all things.*

Did You Know?

British Columbia is unique in Canada for having an 'Independent School Act' that regulates government support as well as legal parameters for schools such as BVCS.

"In 1989, the *Independent School Act (ISA)*, and later amendments, provided the following funding for "Group 1 schools": receive fifty percent of their local school district's per student operating grant on a per Full Time Equivalent (FTE) student basis. To qualify: they employ BC certified teachers, have educational programs consistent with ministerial orders, provide a program that meets the learning outcomes of the British Columbia curriculum, meet various administrative requirements, maintain adequate educational facilities, and comply with municipal and regional district codes. There are currently some 55,000 students enrolled in 255 Group 1 schools."

“Independent schools have freedom to address the curriculum from their own religious, cultural, philosophical or pedagogical perspectives, but they are bound by section 1 of the Schedule of the ISA, subsection 1(a) which reads: ‘*Before issuing or renewing a certificate of group 1, group 2, group 3 or group 4 classification to an authority the inspector must be satisfied that (a) no program is in existence or proposed at the independent school that would, in theory or in practice, promote or foster doctrines of (i) racial or ethnic superiority or persecution (ii) religious intolerance or persecution (iii) social change through violent action, or (iv) sedition*’”.

Highlights of the January 2011 Board of Directors' Meeting

The board met for their first meeting of 2011. Steve DeHoog opened with devotions and prayers. The board approved the minutes of December 2010, and then spent time reviewing reports from the various committees.

The Education committee met on January 10. Highlights of that meeting:

- The committee is doing a literature scope and sequence review;
- after surveying parents and staff, the board recommends that BVCS offer a Full Day Kindergarten beginning September 2011;
- all parents are invited to attend a Home and School evening with the focus topic being "Anti-Bullying". This is scheduled for March 14, 2011; and
- BVCS welcomes our new Cascade Christian counselor, K. Kaseburg. She visits the school on a monthly basis.

The financial reports of December 2010 were available for review. All board chairpersons are reminded that budget requests are to be handed in to the business administrator before February 28, 2011. The board can then begin the planning of the 2011-12 budget to present to the general society members in May.

The board appointed an Ad-Hoc Technology Committee to research and present a budget with needs and costs for technology at the amalgamated campus. This committee has met several times in the past few months, and presented three different options for the board and administrators to review. This will be considered and recommendations will be approved when the budget is finalized.

Our Employee Relations Committee (formerly Compensation) met and spent some time reviewing their current mandate with changes to be made to support the employee relations aspect of the committee. The board approved the mandate with a few small changes to be made. The committee also recommended some changes to the current compensation agreement.

Members of the Building, Grounds and Transportation Committee met on January 4, 2011. The committee is also currently reviewing their existing mandate and recommended a few changes to be made. The board made a few requests for more changes to the mandate. The committee is also reviewing transportation/bussing costs for the upcoming school year; and changes to accommodate students at the unified campus. The janitorial situation is also being reviewed, with recommendations to come to the board for the budget review in early March.

The Amalgamation Committee has been meeting 1-2 times per month, with many fine details and items on their schedule. Work is being done in the modular, with some classrooms becoming usable by late January. Everything is on schedule at this time. A more detailed report will be given at the May Annual General Meeting.

Some time ago, the board appointed a committee to review our current constitution and bylaws. While changes cannot be made to some of these documents, the committee has drafted an "Educational Creed" for BVCS to adopt. The general society will be made aware of this document with announcements in *The Grapevine* and a series of meetings to discuss and preview the recommendations. Please watch for announcement regarding this important event.
